Rabbi Dr. David Dalin, a widely-published scholar of American Jewish history and politics, has taught Jewish history at several universities. He is the author, co-author, or editor of eleven books, including *Religion and State in the American Jewish Experience* (with Prof. Jonathan Sarna of Brandeis University) and *The Presidents of the United States and the Jews*. He has completed a forthcoming book, *The Jewish Justices of the Supreme Court, from Brandeis to Kagan*, scheduled to be published by Brandeis University Press in March, 2017.

Rabbi Dalin received his BA from the University of California at Berkeley. He holds an MA and a PhD from Brandeis University, as well as an MA from the Jewish Theological Seminary, where he also received his rabbinical ordination.



Learn how to chant Haftarah trope. Students should have basic Hebrew reading skills, but no musical skills required.


